Gear Up for Dane County's Ever-Growing Network of Bike Trails

Dane County is proud to have a vast network of bike trails that serve daily commuters, pedestrians, and recreation cyclists throughout the county. In fact, it's estimated that the Capital City Trail and Lower Yahara River Trail support more than 150,000 trips a year. Biking is good for our health, for our environment, and for our communities.

For ten years now, Dane County has provided matching grants to municipalities and non-profits for the development of regional bicycle trail facilities through our PARC & Ride Grant Program. Over \$3 million has gone to more than 30 different bicycle trail projects. A few examples include the Upper Yahara River Trail in Deforest, Wolf Run Trail in Mazomanie, Phase 1 of the Oregon to Badger State Trail near Oregon, and Phase 1 of the CamRock County Park to Glacial Drumlin State Trail.

It's exciting to have communities come forward with plans to strengthen Dane County's network of bike trails. These projects enhance our quality of life and heighten the overall experience visitors and residents can have while enjoying the outdoors.

Planning is underway for several other major bicycle trail projects as well, including a segment of the North Mendota Trail around the north shore of Lake Mendota through Governor Nelson State Park, Phase 2 of the Lower Yahara River Trail, and the Capital City Trail connection to the Glacial Drumlin State Trail. A nearly milelong section of trail at Anderson Farm County Park will also finish soon and connect the park with the Village of Oregon. When complete, all of these projects will provide Madison area residents with outstanding recreation and non-motorized transportation options throughout Dane County.

Dane County continues to be a leader in the planning and development of its regional bicycle trail network, providing safe off-road connections for riders of all ages to a variety of parks and other trails. Biking is a big part of our quality of life and a way for people to get out and enjoy our lakes and countryside. I encourage you to explore them this summer and beyond! \blacklozenge





Jewel in Madison's Crown: Our Park & Pleasure Drive By Shawn Schey

Bordering the shoreline of Lake Wingra, between Edgewood Avenue and Woodrow Street, is a rustic road called the Park & Pleasure Drive. It used to be part of a commuter's shortcut to Vilas Zoo, Park Street and Edgewood College.

With Alder Ken Golden's guidance throughout the 1990's, a neighborhood group called The Friends of the Park & Pleasure Drive convinced the City Parks Commission that it should be treated as a "linear park"-not a street. There were 700 pedestrians using it in the summertime per day, and the mixture of traffic and peds had become dangerous!

The Friends garnered support from a majority of residents on the adjoining streets, and from the following groups to bolster their case: the Dudgeon-Monroe, Vilas, Regent and Greenbush neighborhood associations; the Bicycle Federation of Wisconsin; Bicycle Transportation Alliance of Dane

County; UW-Madison Arboretum; Historical Madison; the Edgewood-Neighborhood Liaison Committee, and the Friends of Lake Wingra.

After 16 years (yep! 16!) of surveys, negotiations, debates, hearings, petitions and conversations, the hammerhead at the west end was constructed in the fall of 2006.

A tally conducted throughout this summer (2021) revealed just how essential this linear park has become--not just for Vilas residents--but the citizenry at-large. As the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 raged, there was an uptick in pedestrian visitors to this linear park, some of which parked their cars on adjoining streets, then unloaded tricycles and children for a trek of solace beneath the trees.

While there were over 700 users per summer day in 2002 prior to the elimination of car traffic, today there are now over 1200! These include

leisurely and "power" walkers; joggers (with dogs, and with baby-strollers); bicyclists; bicyclists with leashed dogs; roller skiers and in-line skaters; dogwalkers; parents pulling wagons of toddlers; children on scooters; teens on skateboards; elderly in wheelchairs, and couples carrying canoes.

If you haven't visited the drive yet this year, be sure to check it out while it's wearing its lushest late-summer best. •



The Monroe Street Library League will hold a book sale Sat., Sept. 25 9:30 – 4 p.m. in conjunction with Monroe Street Days. Pick up gently used books and other treasures. Much of the inventory will be outside if weather allows.

Expired library cards?

Library accounts expire every four years to ensure we have your contact info. If your card expires you can log in and renew your checkouts, but you won't be able to place holds or use Libby/ Overdrive until your card is renewed.

When libraries closed for in-person service, expiration dates were extended. Now that we have reopened, we'll be updating patron records for the rest of the year. The quickest and easiest way to renew your card is to come in with your card and a photo ID. Proof of address is not needed if the card has been expired for less than six months.

Each year the library partners with UW-Madison to extend its popular Go Big Read program into the broader community. This year's book selection is Transcendent Kingdom, fiction by Yaa Gyasi. 


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A Message from Alder Tag Evers

Ever since I was elected as your alder, I've focused a great deal of attention on two key projects -- the Truman Olson project on South Park and Bayview's redevelopment project on the Triangle.

In July, I learned that Luna's Groceries, the grocery store selected to replace the aging Pick 'n Save, was not able to come up with their financing. Consequently, the entire project was at risk, including the grocery store and the 150 units of much-needed permanent affordable housing.

Working with city staff, we devised a plan for the City to purchase the 24,000 square foot condominium unit, the shell within which the grocery store would be built, an expenditure requiring a \$4.7 million budget amendment.

Food access in South Madison is an equity issue. It's important to note we have made investments to secure food access in wealthier areas of the City. For example, the Monroe Commons development housing Trader Joe's benefited from tax-incremental financing (TIF), a public investment considered necessary to make the project work.

Access to healthy food is a public good, and when the market is unable to deliver, it's an appropriate role for government to bridge the gap. By making this purchase, the Truman Olson project moves forward, with construction to start this fall.

Meanwhile, Kroger's, the owner of Pick 'n Save, has indicated a willingness to work with the City to avoid a grocery gap, our number one goal from day one.

While the Truman Olson project has experienced frustrating delays, the Bayview redevelopment has started construction of the first building at the corner of Regent St and West Washington. The official groundbreaking ceremony took place on August 18. This is very exciting news and I look forward to watching this project unfold.

Both Truman Olson and Bayview are of paramount importance. We have a duty to look out for each other, particularly those less fortunate. I'm grateful to have received positive feedback from many of you regarding these two projects.

The Lake Wingra Heritage Plan working group continues to meet as we focus on ways we can protect and enhance the jewel that is Lake Wingra. In August, we met with Mark Cupp from the Lower Wisconsin Riverway to learn about how a similarly treasured natural resource received legal status for aesthetic preservation.

The numbers from the Census confirmed we are growing city. If we are going to deal responsibly with climate change and traffic congestion, we have little choice but to grow up rather than sprawl out. However, that process of adding density and infill must be managed in the context of our greenspaces, our parks and our lakes. That's why I've been pushing city staff to update our lighting ordinance, so that the viewshed around Lake Wingra, for example, is not negatively impacted.

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


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
