

Once Per Week Parking Restrictions In Effect Today, January 15

I've received multiple complaints about the amount of snow that blocks driveways once the snowplows have passed. I understand the frustration, but here's something to keep in mind:

Madison has 1,818 miles of traffic lanes. That's like driving from Madison to the Mojave Desert in California.

That is actually underselling the job a little bit, too, because you have to drive up and down these streets more than just once to get them plowed. And it doesn't factor in bus stops, bike paths, carriage lanes/alleyways, city-maintained sidewalks, etc. We've

received practically a season's worth of a snow in the past week, and there is significant amount of clean-up to do in the days ahead. Let's ease up on the complaints about our hard-working city staff, working around the clock to keep our streets safe.

There is another plow update to share, but let's talk about Monday and parking rules first.

Starting Monday, January 15, we're asking residents to follow the posted parking restrictions to help us widen the areas. We will have plows ready to push back snow on these Clean Streets, Clean Lakes marked streets during the dates and times on those parking signs. All of District 13 is now included in the CSCL program. Important work starts on Monday, January 15 to clear our streets to the curb.

Residents can help keep their street passable for the rest of winter by following the posted parking signs staring on Monday morning, because our plows will be through during those times to plow back the snow.

As for today and tonight, crews are out sanding, plowing back snow, working on bus stops and sidewalks, watching for drifting on outlying areas. Roads are snow-covered as expected due to another helping of snow last night and the sub-salting temperatures. Follow Posted Parking Restrictions to Help Ongoing Snowstorm Cleanup

Starting on Monday, January 15 and continuing throughout winter, the Streets Division will be using the posted daytime parking restrictions to prevent streets from narrowing due to the accumulating snow.

The Streets Division asks that all residents that park on the street to please follow these posted restrictions in order to help plow drivers work as they push the snow back, so the roads can remain passable for all traffic throughout the rest of winter.

As snow piles up, cars park further and further out from the curb, creeping out into the travel lane. This makes it where certain streets can become impassable for emergency service vehicles (like fire trucks and ambulances) essential services (like recycling and trash collection trucks), and also just normal passenger vehicles. The only way for the streets to be widened so they can be safe for travel are for people to follow the posted parking signs so plowbacks can be performed.






Traffic Investigation Unit

The Traffic Investigations Unit ensures that the Madison Police Department provides professional investigative services in the aftermath of vehicular crashes. Typically most vehicle collisions only require patrol response for investigative and safety purposes. The responding officer(s) will complete all necessary aspects of the vehicle collision investigation, and involved parties are provided with a case number used to access all related police reports documenting the collision. Traffic investigators, on the other hand, participate in ongoing police investigations of substantial vehicular crashes and/or hit and run collisions.

- Both collections are weather dependent as snowstorm response takes precedence.

Round Two Information - January 16, 2024

- In order to have your tree collected set your tree to on the terrace or right-of-way space near the public street by your home on or by 6:30am on January 15

Wreaths, Garlands, Boughs, Other Evergreen Decorations

- Do not place wreaths, evergreen rope, garlands, and boughs out for tree collection.
- These belong in the trash.
 - They contain wires or metal that can damage wood chipping equipment.

Monona Terrace to Close for Renovation in January

Monona Terrace Community and Convention Center will be closing to the public for just over two weeks in January for facility improvements. The closure will begin on Tuesday, January 9, 2024 following the Madison Home Expo, through Friday, January 26, 2024. Planned projects include replacement of the facility's signature carpeting, restoration of wood doors and furniture, resurfacing of the kitchen flooring, painting throughout the building, and other repairs.

Job shadow program looks to connect officers, community members in new way

The Madison Police Department has created a special job shadow program allowing community members and officers to learn from one another. The Madison Proximity Project pairs a Madison resident with an officer. The officer will shadow this person at their place of employment, and in return, that person will participate in a ridealong with the officer.

There are six pairings in the inaugural round. The co-learning experiences will take place throughout the month of January. The first occurred on Thursday when a sergeant shadowed the program manager for Operation Fresh Start.



Participants will come together, over dinner, in February to share what they've learned.

"We believe in the power of "proximity" as a force multiplier in our efforts to connect with the Madison community," Madison Police Chief Shon Barnes said. "You cannot increase trust and bridge gaps from a distance. You must be willing to establish meaningful relationships in order to increase trust.

"I believe this opportunity will do just that, by creating a program that we hope will lead to a lasting relationship of mutual trust and understanding between a valued community member and a member of our police department."

Alternate Side Parking Rules **Español**

Don't let the snow lead to a ticket or a tow. Here are few things you need to know to avoid a ticket or a tow:

- Alternate Side Parking is in effect city-wide with the exception of the <u>Snow Emergency Zone</u> (unless there is a <u>Declared Snow Emergency</u>).
- Alternate Side Parking is in effect from November 15 -March 15, seven days a week, regardless of weather conditions.
- Park on the EVEN house numbered side of the street on even numbered days from 1:00 am – 7:00 am.
- Park on the ODD house numbered side of the street on odd numbered days from 1:00 am – 7:00 am.

Fines

 Violations of the Alternate Side Parking rules are subject to a fine of \$20 when a Snow Emergency has not been declared. Violations of the Alternate Side Parking rules are subject to a fine of \$60 when a Snow Emergency has been declared.
