Absentee Voter Reminder

With just two weeks remaining before the February 20 Primary Election, the City Clerk's Office reminds voters who would like to receive an absentee ballot in the mail that time is of the essence.

Madison mail is taken to Milwaukee for sorting, so it could take up to a week to receive your absentee ballot in the mail. Plan on an additional week for your ballot to return to the Clerk's Office through the mail.

Postmarks on absentee ballots do not count. Your ballot must be at your polling place on Election Day in order to be counted.

To request an absentee and track your ballot, visit <u>myvote.wi.gov</u>.

The goal of the City Clerk's Office is that each eligible voter will be able to cast a ballot and have that ballot count.

Winter Bike Day is Back!

Demonstrating that biking isn't just a summer activity, even in snowy Wisconsin, the local bicycle advocacy group Madison Bikes is hosting a Winter Bike Day on Friday February 9.

Madison Bikes envisions a Madison where anyone can ride a bicycle conveniently and comfortably to any place year-round, including the winter months. Christo Alexander, vice president of Madison Bikes, says, "people will ride a bicycle in the Winter if the city is designed for it. Madison Bikes is working hard to promote safe biking infrastructure and we want you to come out and talk with us about the best and worst things about Winter biking in our city."

To celebrate International Winter Bike Day, Madison Bikes, in partnership with the City of Madison, will host a couple of events.

 the Capital City Path near the Monona Terrace bike elevator.
- Later that day, join us for happy hour at Working Draft Beer, located at 1129 E. Wilson St. Don't forget to bring your helmet and show your <u>Bike Benefits sticker</u> and receive 10% off your purchase. In addition to their brews, Working Draft also offers a selection of nonalcoholic options.



Madison Launches New Program to Improve Rental Housing

The City of Madison is excited to announce the launch of an aggressive new effort to help local owners of rental housing finance improvements to their properties. The Rental Rehab Program offers help to owners that need to make major repairs to their properties, implement energyefficiency upgrades, and comply with building codes and regulations.

The program offers owners of properties that charge no more than fair market rents access to up to \$200,000 in low-cost loans to update or improve housing units. The amount of funding available varies based on the number of units in the property – owners of 1-6-unit buildings qualify for up to \$75,000; those with 7-12 units can get up to \$150,000; and 13-20 units qualify for up to \$200,000. For the first year, the City will waive application fees and offer more attractive loan terms for properties within identified north, south, and southwest neighborhood boundaries to encourage participation of property owners in those locations.

The investments made possible with this program will help prevent, or reverse, the deterioration of rental properties, reduce the risk of safety hazards, and extend the life of aging buildings. At the same time, they will enable property owners to upgrade to local housing standards and improve the quality of housing for their tenants.

"Our housing crisis requires an all-of-the-above approach," said Mayor Satya Rhodes-Conway. "While we work bring more housing to Madison, we must also take care of what we have – not only to preserve our housing supply, but also because all Madison residents deserve to live in safe and decent housing. The Rental Rehab Program is another tool toward that goal."

Sustained population growth, changing demographics, and other market factors have combined to create a very difficult housing market, across the country and locally, especially for lower-income households. As a result, low-income households have limited options for safe and decent rental housing. Much has been done to promote the development of new rental housing in Madison but the Rental Rehab Program recognizes that a lot of good rental housing already exists here – some of it just needs a little TLC.

"The rental rehab program reflects the City's unwavering commitment to thriving and inclusive communities," said Community Development Director Jim O'Keefe. "Everyone deserves a safe and affordable place to call home. By partnering with owners of smaller rental properties, we can improve housing conditions in our city today and have a lasting impact on the quality of life in Madison neighborhoods."

Alternate Side Parking Rules **Español**

Don't let the snow lead to a ticket or a tow. Here are few things you need to know to avoid a ticket or a tow:

- Alternate Side Parking is in effect city-wide with the exception of the <u>Snow Emergency Zone</u> (unless there is a <u>Declared Snow</u> <u>Emergency</u>).
- Alternate Side Parking is in effect from November 15 March 15, seven days a week, regardless of weather conditions.
- Park on the EVEN house numbered side of the street on even numbered days from 1:00 am – 7:00 am.
- Park on the ODD house numbered side of the street on odd numbered days from 1:00 am – 7:00 am.

Fines

- Violations of the Alternate Side Parking rules are subject to a fine of \$20 when a Snow Emergency has not been declared.
- Violations of the Alternate Side Parking rules are subject to a fine of \$60 when a Snow Emergency has been declared.
